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DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Dearest Allies of IYC,

You're meeting Fred today, a puppet that's larger than life. Fred has big dreams and he's more human than you think.

Meet Fred asks the same question as I do in all my productions - "What is normal?"

The heart of Fred's story furiously beats the same question of what makes us human and humane. We are often so limited by these ideas of normalcy that we culturally police ourselves and others in what we should or should not achieve.

Personally, Meet Fred is about power and transcendence but not in the inspirationally superhuman sense. Our d/Deaf and disabled community seeks belonging, not benevolence. And meaningful representation calls for mainstream society to embrace the value of disability as part of the very fabric of the human experience, rather than being seen as less than, or ostracised.

Perhaps today, you will find that a part of you is just like Fred. As you ride the transitions in your life with your own set of differences and needs, you're also shooting for the stars of transcendence. You are carving out moments to dream limitlessly and actualise a better version of yourself.

That's where the power of your own narrative as a human being lies. Enjoy.

THE HIJINX PROCESS

As Hijinx explored the concept of creating an inclusive show with a puppet, the parallels between life for a puppet and the learning disabled artists that they worked with quickly became apparent.

Just as many of the people that they worked with rely on support in order to live an independent life, so does Fred rely on his puppeteers simply to exist. The relationship of dependence and interdependence that exists between Fred and his puppeteers is the exact same situation that many people with learning disability and disability in general face in their everyday life.

Inevitably during a devising process, it is the people present in the room that ultimately influence the direction a piece may go, and crucially what their experience is of the world at any given time. As the show was made, many of the learning disabled performers were living through the current overhaul of the benefits system by UK's Tory government then.

Hijinx and Blind Summit began to explore how life would be for Fred if he also lived in this environment – what would happen if Fred is threatened with losing his Puppetry Living Allowance? What would Fred be without his puppeteers? Would he even survive?

Suddenly, instead of the whimsical, light puppet show Hijinx had envisaged, they had a serious political message on their hands that could be presented with hilarity and made seem all the more ridiculous when seen through the eyes of the puppet hero Fred.

And when brought to Singapore, they are struck as they investigate who Fred is here.



SYNOPSIS

Meet Fred, a puppet with a lot of personality who's trying to make sense of a confusing world. Fred just wants to be like everyone else, but being a puppet stands in his way. Being completely dependent on his puppeteers makes things... complicated. Especially when his PLA (Puppetry Living Allowance) is threatened, and one of his puppeteers might be gone!

Fred seems to navigate a world stacked against him. His journey reflects the struggles faced by many, especially those with disabilities, as he tackles paperwork, misunderstandings, and the quest for a normal life. Yet, amid the challenges, Fred discovers surprising moments of joy that light up his path!

Meet Fred tells a story that proves even the smallest among us have the biggest stories to tell. Filled with humour and full of heart, this charming tale is sure to keep you smiling long after the curtain falls.

Hijinx

Hijinx is an award-winning, inclusive theatre company based in Cardiff. All their productions include learning disabled performers alongside performers without learning disability. To support their work they have a network of Academies around Wales that train learning disabled performers in a variety of skills. They provide this training because it is virtually impossible for an actor with learning disability to access more traditional drama schools or universities. When ready, students from their Academies join them on their professional productions. This ensures that their work is always of the highest quality, with all artists starting a process on an equal footing. *Meet Fred* originally features three of their performers with learning disability, all of whom were heavily involved in the devising of the production.

Blind Summit

Based in London, Blind Summit is recognised as one of UK's most exciting companies working with puppetry. They have had huge success with productions such as *The Table* and *Citizen Puppet*, and often work with companies such as Complicite and ENO. Hijinx came into contact with Blind Summit in April 2014 when they invited them to run a week's training in puppetry for their Academy students in Cardiff. Hijinx was joined by three of Blind Summit's artists, including Artistic Director Mark Down. It was during this week that the seed for making an inclusive production with a puppet was sown.

Grace Lee Khoo Director

Grace Lee Khoo is the founder of Access Path Productions, Singapore's first disability-led theatre company. She graduated from Royal Central School of Speech and Drama and National University of Singapore's theatre studies program and now works internationally as a director, performer, producer, dramaturg, researcher, drama educator, audio describer for the blind/visionimpaired and creative access consultant. Grace was international artist-inresidence at Graeae Theatre Company (London) in 2017.

Grace currently serves as the lead artist of the Inclusive Young Company (IYC) - in collaboration with Singapore Repertory Theatre. With SRT, Grace has directed *Silence Bubble* (2018), Kaite O'Reilly's *9 Fridas* (2022) and Sarah Kane's *4.48 Psychosis* (2023).

Significant works include touring Unlimited UK commission Kaite O'Reilly's *And Suddenly I Disappear* (2017-2018), National Gallery Singapore commissions *Glimpse* (2023), *Self Portrait* (2019) and Singapore Art Museum commissions *desert of the ocean (doldrums)* for Singapore Art Week 2024, *Patterns of Perception* for Singapore Biennale 2023.

Regina Foo Movement Director

Regina enjoys the process of theatre making as a prism to experience the facets of life, to open minds and to indulge in the colourful spectrum of human emotions both light and dark. She aspires to tap on the power of theatre as an intimate space where people can share stories to find strength, courage and hope to live, as life pulls us in many directions.

Since her graduation from Intercultural Theatre Institute in 2017, she has been focused on developing her practice to be shared with young children and adults with disabilities. She is also currently exploring projected play through puppetry and object manipulation.

Laura McEwen Production Designer

Laura has worked nationally and internationally as a theatre set and costume designer for more than twenty years and is based in England. She has a specialism in designing for younger audiences, including designs for a range of companies such as the Royal Shakespeare Company, English National Opera, Polka Theatre, London, Unicorn Theatre, Nottingham Playhouse and York Theatre Royal. This is her second show for Singapore Repertory Theatre and she is really excited to join the team.

In addition to designing for theatre, Laura has undertaken a range of projects designing interactive spaces for young people. Most recently, this included the RIBA award nominated designs for the public spaces at Polka Theatre, London, in collaboration with Foster Wilson Architects.

Laura is also a practising artist and has had her artwork exhibited at the Royal Academy in London on numerous occasions.

Noor Hidayat Norzizan Sound Designer

Noor Hidayat Norzizan, affectionately known as "Yat" to his colleagues, is a seasoned senior stage technician at the Singapore Repertory Theatre. At the heart of Hidayat's work lies his deep love for sound design. He approaches each project as a canvas, using sound as his paintbrush to create immersive and unforgettable auditory experiences. His meticulous attention to detail ensures that every note, tone, and sound effect resonates perfectly with the production's narrative, enhancing the audience's emotional connection to the performances.

Offstage, Hidayat continues to explore the endless possibilities of sound, constantly pushing boundaries and expanding his creative horizons. His dedication to the art of sound design is not just a profession; it's a lifelong passion that enriches the world of theatre and leaves a lasting impact on all who have the pleasure of experiencing his work. Some of his work includes *Ghostlight, Girls Like That, A Monster Calls* (SRT's The Young Company) and *It's SG, It's So Good!* (Singapore Food Agency).

ACCESS PARTNERS

Joanna Ong Creative Captioner & Creative Enabler

Meet Joanna, a creative captions designer and arts manager. As a captions designer, she adopts the 'aesthetics of access' approach to integrate captions into the design and aesthetic of live performances, enabling the Hearing and Deaf communities to enjoy live performances together. Her recent works include *And the Cats Dance by the Light* (2024) by Intercultural Theatre Institute, *SmartyPants and the Swordfish* (2024) by ART:DIS and *Open the Curtains* (2023) by SRT's Inclusive Young Company. Philippe Pang Creative Captioner
